### Spring Cleanup Program Town of Dewey-Humboldt

Starting on Tuesday, **May 8, 2018** and continuing through **Friday, May 11, 2018**, the Town of Dewey-Humboldt will be conducting its **Spring Cleanup Program** and will be accepting discarded items.

Items that **will not** be accepted are:

- Tires
- Oils
- Hazardous Chemicals
- Refrigerators/Freezers with Freon/
- Coolant Canisters Attached
- Household Trash
- Batteries

We **will** be accepting brush and yard clippings, as this will be part of the Town Firewise Program.



Dumpsters will be available to handle your discards and a separate area will be available to receive brush and yard clippings for later chipping and mulching.

The hours will be 8:00–6:00 starting Tuesday, May 8<sup>th</sup>, through Friday, May 11<sup>th</sup>.

**The location for the Spring Cleanup Program is the Town owned lot in downtown Humboldt, located at 12938 E. Main Street.**

Following the Spring Cleanup Program, the Town will be making mulch available from the chipping of wood, brush and yard clippings. The mulch will be available on an appointment basis, starting on Monday, May 17, 2018, from 8:00-5:00 each day until all of the mulch has been disposed of.

### Outside Storage

The question has come up many times, about the ability of residents to use a travel trailer motor home or recreational vehicle as occasional overflow guest room for relatives or guests. It is possible to do so, for a period not to exceed 90 days of continuous occupation, and subject to the following:

#### **§ 153.086 OUTSIDE STORAGE**

(4) *Temporary use of a travel trailer, motor home or recreational vehicle as an occasional overflow guest room for non-paying or non-reimbursing relatives or guests is authorized as outlined provided such interim use does not exceed 90 days of continuous duration or a total of 90 days in a year or one 12-month period. Temporary use of recreational vehicles shall be only authorized upon satisfaction of the following performance criteria:*

- a) *Subject property is occupied by a permitted primary residential structure.*
- b) *The Yavapai County Environmental Unit shall be furnished with information to determine that the septic or sanitary facilities are adequate to accommodate additional effluent from the temporary recreational vehicle (RV) unit installation.*
- c) *Verification by the Zoning Administrator that the foregoing criteria have been addressed prior to authorizing occupancy of the unit.*

*The Zoning Administrator will keep a log of those registering their guests and verifying clearance by Yavapai County.*



### Fire Season is Here!

Wildfire season has begun - it runs from March to October. It's not too late to take measures now to get your property in Firewise condition. "Firewising" not only applies to people who own property next to the forest or live within an HOA, it also includes those surrounded by grassland. Creating a **defensible space** to reduce the risk of fire is important everywhere in Dewey-Humboldt. Even if a property has no pine trees or chaparral brush, dry weeds and grass are just as dangerous in wildfires. According to the Arizona State Climate Office, Arizona is currently in its 21st year of a long-term drought.

### The D-H Firewise FIRE WATCH TEAM

In less than one month, **three fires occurred in our town** that not only caused property damage, but also posed a serious threat to our whole community had they not been brought under control by our faithful firefighters. Whether from structure fires or wildfires caused by other events, our community is always at risk; therefore, it is our responsibility as a community to work with our local fire department to ensure that our families and properties are protected. To that end, D-H Firewise is **calling for volunteers to join our FIRE WATCH TEAM.**

This team, made up of Dewey-Humboldt residents, will provide an **invaluable safety service** to the whole town by being the **eyes of the community.** During the fire season, one to three days per month (depending upon the size of our team) each member of the Dewey-Humboldt Firewise **Fire Watch Team** will keep an eye out for fire around our town by taking a few **simple actions:**

**(D-H Firewise FIRE WATCH TEAM continued)**

1. Commit to stepping outside for 5 minutes, once in the morning, afternoon and evening, of your assigned day to scan for fire and smoke in the sky and horizon around Dewey-Humboldt.

2. If you have internet, go to the website [wildlandfire.az.gov/wildfire\\_news.asp](http://wildlandfire.az.gov/wildfire_news.asp) once or twice during the day and evening to learn of any new or updated fires in our area.

3. If you see or learn of anything suspicious, contact Vickie Wendt or Nadine Lalich by text or email to report that information. They will then forward an email to all residents in our **Firewise Database**. Of course, if you perceive an imminent threat, call 911.

### Defensible Space

Creating defensible space is essential to improve your home's chance of surviving a wildfire. It's the buffer you create between a building on your property and the grass, trees, shrubs, or any wildland area that surround it. This space is needed to slow or stop the spread of wildfire and it protects your home from catching fire—either from direct flame contact or radiant heat. Defensible space is also important for the protection of the firefighters defending your home. For more information go to the National Fire Protection Agency website:

*Research around home destruction vs. home survival in wildfires point to embers and small flames as the main way that the majority of homes ignite in wildfires. Embers are burning pieces of airborne wood and/or vegetation that can be carried more than a mile through the wind can cause spot fires and ignite homes, debris and other objects.*



### Abatement Update

Dewey-Humboldt received grant money from PAWUIC to help abate 35 residences totaling 32 acres. Three individual grant acre properties still remain available for Foothills East area.

**FIRE RESTRICTIONS**

The Prescott National Forest, along with all local entities, enacted Stage 1 fire restrictions on April 20.

"There has been no appreciable amount of precipitation since the end of last summer's monsoons and the little bit or rain and snow we received in January and February did nothing to relieve the situation," said Pete Gordon, Fuels, Fire, & Aviation staff officer for the Prescott National Forest.

The following prohibitions will be in effect for all Prescott National Forest lands, as well as Yavapai County, and other municipal and volunteer fire department coverage areas:



Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, charcoal, coal, or wood stove, except in developed recreation sites with metal fire rings or

cooking grills.

Forest visitors are urged to reference the Prescott National Forest website for a list of developed recreation sites allowing campfires under Stage 1 fire restrictions  
[www.fs.usda.gov/prescott](http://www.fs.usda.gov/prescott)

Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building, or in a developed recreation site in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable materials.

Discharging a firearm, air rifle, or gas gun; except while engaged in a lawful hunt pursuant to state, federal laws and regulations.

Violation of these fire restrictions is punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000 and imprisonment for up to six months.


"The decision to implement Stage I restrictions is based on scientific indicators of conditions in addition to fire activity, resource shortages or potential, and other criteria affecting wildfire potential," Gordon said, adding that the "Prescott National Forest has coordinated closely with all of the area federal wildfire management agencies... adjacent to the forest."



**Pollo Estilo Guanajuato  
Chicken Guanajuato**

*From Mexican Regional Cooking  
By Diana Kennedy*

- 1 1/2 whole chicken
  - Salt and pepper (s&p)
  - 3 tbsp. peanut or safflower oil
  - 1 large onion, thickly sliced
  - 3 cloves garlic, peeled & chopped
  - 3 medium tomatoes, broiled
  - 1/4 heaped tsp. thyme
  - 1/4 heaped tsp. marjoram
  - 3/4" piece cinnamon bark
  - 1 1/4 cups fresh orange juice
  - Rind of 1/2 orange
  - 12 small new potatoes, peeled
  - 5 medium carrots, cut in 4 lengthwise
- Preheat oven to 350. Season chicken with s&p. Heat oil in flameproof casserole & brown chicken all over. Remove from casserole, sprinkle with more s&p & set aside. Remove all but 2 tbsp. of oil & fry the onion & garlic without browning, until translucent. Blend tomatoes until smooth. Add to pan together with thyme, marjoram and cinnamon bark & fry on high for about 3 minutes, stirring & scraping the pan frequently. Add chicken, orange juice & rind, potatoes & carrots. Cover & bake for 30 minutes, turn the chicken over & bake until tender another 20-25 minutes. Cut chicken into serving pieces & serve with plenty of sauce & vegetables.
