Annual Spring Chipseal Project

The Public Works Department will begin the annual Spring Chipseal Project in June. The project will entail a chip overlay of existing roads throughout town with a fog (a thin liquid oil) coating once the chips are applied.



There will be message boards up in the area of Kachina Road; the area of Foothill Drive, south of State Route 169; and Old Black Canyon Highway, north of Prescott Street for three days prior to the scheduled work. Please note the days that are scheduled and have the roads free of parked vehicles.

Please anticipate minor delays and watch out for equipment and personnel while driving in these areas.

Every two years Dewey-Humboldt residents elect three Council Members and the Mayor.

Following are important D-H election dates:

Wednesday, May 30th - Deadline for filing Candidate Nomination Papers (5pm).

Friday, June 29th - Soonest Candidate signs can go up.

Thursday, July 19th - Nomination papers from **Write-in** Candidates due.

Monday, July 30th - LAST DAY TO REGISTER- County Voter Registration closes (5pm).

Thursday, August 23rd - Nomination papers from **Late Vacancy Write-in** Candidates due.

Tuesday, August 28th - PRIMARY ELECTION DAY.

Code Enforcement in Dewey-Humboldt (A Guide)

Code Enforcement is a division of the Community Development Department who investigate and prosecute violations of the Dewey-Humboldt Codes Governing: signage, nuisances such as junk vehicles, housing standards and residential and commercial zoning.

Why do We Have Code Enforcement

Code Enforcement enhances the quality of life and economy of Dewey-Humboldt by enforcing regulations that preserve and protect neighbor-

hoods. The Division will promote voluntary compliance wherever possible.

What Issues Does Code Enforcement Deal With

- Residential and Commercial Zoning
- Signs
- Unpermitted Uses
- Public Nuisances
- Abandoned Vehicles
- Construction without a Building Permit

How is Code Enforcement Investigated and Prosecuted

Code Enforcement in the Town of Dewey-Humboldt is driven by complaints received in writing, either in person at the Town Hall, by mail, email, or Fax. We will not initiate an investigation absent a complaint. The only exception to this is where there is a demonstrated health or safety concern with an eminent risk to the public.

The Town of Dewey-Humboldt needs the help of each citizen to maintain our community pride. We do not have the resources to engage in pro-active enforcement, so we depend on the citizens of the community to bring issues to our attention. To protect this relationship, the Town will make every attempt to keep the complaints confidential.

A good-sized crowd of 88, which included Historical Society members and the general public, were treated to guided tours through the Union Mine by John Young, DHHS Vice-President & Museum Director. Afterward, visitors had a chance to view an arrastra (a primitive device for grinding ore) which was discovered nearby. In the spirit of Cinco de Mayo, a wonderful Mexican style lunch was served, while the attendees listened to music by Fireside Bluegrass and an interesting lecture on mining in Arizona by Richard Smith. There was fun and games, including a 50/50 raffle supporting the Historical Society. The Gold Prospectors Association of Phoenix demonstrated gold panning and also held a raffle benefiting the Society. Charlotte Klein, the event organizer commented, "The day was just beautiful with clear blue skies. Hope to see you next year!" Funds raised in this year's event will be used to further the Society's mission including setting up ranching, farming & mining exhibits at Mortimer Farms.





SHRIMP SALAD STUFFED AVOCADOS

From Delish



- 2 Avocados, pitted
- 2 tbsp. Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1/2 lb. raw, de-veined shrimp
- 1 c. cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1/2 c. corn (fresh, frozen, or canned)
- 1/4 c. Greek yogurt
- Juice of 1 lemon
- Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper
Basil, for garnish

Scoop out avocados, leaving a small border. Dice avocado and set aside. In a skillet over medium-high heat, heat olive oil. Add shrimp and cook until fully cooked through, 5-7 minutes. Let cool, then chop into bite-size pieces. In a large bowl, toss diced avocado with shrimp, tomatoes, corn, Greek yogurt, and lemon juice. Season with salt and pepper. Divide salad among 4 avocado halves. Garnish with basil.

"BUCKLE UP ARIZONA... IT'S THE LAW" ENFORCEMENT CAMPAIGN

In an effort to save more lives on Arizona roadways, the Governor's Office of Highway Safety is joining the Yavapai County Sheriff's Office and our local law enforcement partners to enforce Arizona's seat belt and child safety seat laws.

The enforcement effort will run from May 21st through June 3rd.

Arizona has a secondary seat belt law that allows officers to only issue citations for violations during traffic stops for other violations. However, Arizona's child restraint law is a primary enforcement measure under which officers can stop vehicles because of suspected violations of that law.

This aggressive enforcement campaign is based upon high visibility traffic enforcement with a "zero-tolerance" approach towards seat belt and child safety seat usage.
